MENTALLY ILL, NEED LOVE

Often, India tends to be medieval in attitude. Clothed in the trappings of the 21st century, this nation can easily be accused of sporting a mind that goes back by a few hundred years.

Mental health is an area of such a disturbing clash. Barring some hundreds of thousands, the 100 million or so of the mentally ill are treated worse than criminals, confined to hospitals, sometimes chained to their beds and usually forgotten even by their close relatives. The sick get little care or comfort in the 40-odd Government asylums. Most patients never seem to leave the hospitals, because their families refuse to take them back. Forgotten and forlorn, the ailing men and women place an enormous burden on the abysmally small number of doctors and nurses. There are just 4000 clinical psychologists

in India, 3500 psychiatrists, 900 psychiatric nurses and 1000 psychiatric social workers. The problem is far too complex to be tackled by funds alone. The human brain is still the least understood part of the body. With a medical fraternity still trying to comprehend the mind better, the primeval fear of the unknown extends beyond the hospital wards to the streets, where the tendency is to run away from the mad men and women or worse still throw a few stones at them, much like the way those with leprosy were treated in the Middle Ages or the Victims of AIDS till the other day.

The sad fact is that most of us do not even know the first symptoms of it, which can be as innocuous as lethargy, insomnia, lack of appetite, lack of clarity of thought and just plain unhappiness. The solution clearly lies in education. Teachers can spread valuable knowledge among the young. Obviously, there is pressing need for this kind of service: otherwise, why would hundreds of mentally ill languish in virtual “prisons” or be placed at the mercy of “magicians” and “soothsayers” who literally torture the sick? (Ritual beatings are part of the “treatment”)

With India facing some of the dark maladies of the present times – economic recession, job insecurity, intense competition, shrinking familial support and a largely unfeeling community “going mad” is no longer a possibility, but a probability. Experts aver that the group most vulnerable to this bane is the 18-30 year olds, the most productive among all. Also, there is an urgent need to extend psychiatric care to villages and towns. Those who are sick in their minds and require a lot of love whose curative properties are phenomenal. A last word, show compassion to those who may be silently crying for it.
